

WHAT WE DO

Guidance

The Commission issues informal guidance on all aspects of the Guam Ethics Code, including but not limited to:

- An employee's responsibility when receiving or accepting gifts from private or government sources
- · A Public Official's responsibility when filing financial disclosures and gift disclosures
- An employee's post-employment restrictions after separating from government service.

Ensuring Compliance with 03 disclosure laws

All financial disclosure statements filed by Government of Guam officials shall be maintained bν the Guam **Ethics** Commission during the term of office of the employee, and for a period of three years thereafter.

02 Educational Training

Following the enactment of Public Law 36-25, in addition to elected and appointed officials, all Government of Guam employees shall attend and complete the **Ethics** Government Program hosted Guam the Commission, or other provider approved by the Guam Ethics Commission.

04 Enforcing Ethics Laws

The Commission shall receive and review complaints and conduct confidential investigations concerning potential violations.





MAJOR ACCOMPLISHMENTS


- The Commission successfully issued and awarded two professional contracts which provided the Commission with a general counsel and prosecutor for the adjudication of cases presented before it.
- In March 2022, the process for receiving complaints officially launched with nearly 40 cases filed before the end of the calendar year 2022.
- The Commission obtained a 33% increase in local appropriation from the general fund to the Commission. Further, legislative authorization was secured for the second year in a row for the Commission to utilize available funds in the Government Ethics Special Fund. This authorization helps the Commission satisfy any unmet need experienced from the lack of general appropriation funding.
- The Commission successfully prepared and submitted the draft administrative rules, as approved by the Commission. To facilitate the rule development process, a comprehensive enterprise-wide study was conducted, providing valuable insights into employee attitudes towards mandatory ethics training and the corresponding disciplinary actions for non-compliance. The rules were subsequently transmitted to the Office of the Governor and the Office of the Attorney General for their review and necessary action.
- The Commission collaborated with the University of Guam School of Business and Public Administration to initiate the Ethics in Leadership pilot program. This program aims to recognize students who have successfully completed the PA 405 Leadership Ethics in the Professions course by awarding them a certificate of completion for the Ethics in Government Program.



Ethics Training



Ensure adequate number of ethics training workshops are conducted to meet existing demand.

Ethics Partnerships



Executive Director to explore partnerships with ethics commissions of Hawaii and American Samoa.
