Re: Bill No. 45-37 (COR) An Act to Amend § 5230 of Chapter 5, Title 5, Guam Code Annotated, Relative to Clarifying the Process for the Determination of Responsibility of Bidders and Offerors in Procurement.

Hafa adai Senator Perez and Committee Members,

The Office of Public Accountability (OPA) submits this testimony in support of Bill Number 45-37 (COR), introduced by Senator Sabina Flores Perez, with some additional comments.

Bill No. 45-37 intents to update current statutes by clarifying standard and processes in making a determination of responsibility by providing for specialty requirements with the assistance with experts, as is necessary for successful completion of a contract and that applies to all bidders and offerors.

Our office supports the idea of having something in place that is stricter when it comes to determining responsibility, whether it be more affidavits included or certifications put in place before the awarding of a contract. As an example, when it comes to construction project, the purchasing agency should have that assurance that any construction company has the personnel, financial capability, and licenses in place when they place their bid.

Our office currently oversees the request for proposals (RFP) for all government of Guam contracts for independent financial audit services. When we receive proposals from audit first, we can already see who will be working on the audits, complete with their biography, resume, qualifications, copies of certifications, and continuing professional education (CPE) credits to ensure they are up-to-date with their requirements. The goal is to see who has the most qualified people to do the job and if they have sufficient personnel, to ensure they have the financial performance to see that the job is finished, and ensure their certifications and licenses are up-to-date.

Although it is currently allowed where you do not have to acquire a license until after an award is given, it might be time to change the law to make it so a vendor has all their licenses in place beforehand. This will ensure there are no issues when it comes to determining responsibility.
